- In December, we studied Obadiah, Joel, Jonah, Nahum, Amos and Micah. This month, we will finish our study on the Minor Prophets. Chronologically, we skipped Hosea, which is written after Amos, but before Micah. In preparation for our study, please review the following summary quote and then fill in the Information below.
- The Minor Prophets from Obadiah to Malachi cover a four-hundred-year span of history moving through the Assyrian, Babylonian, and Persian Empires. Three were prophets to the northern kingdom (Jonah, Amos, Hosea), six were prophets to the southern kingdom (Obadiah, Joel, Micah, Nahum, Zephaniah, Habakkuk), and three were postexilic prophets (Haggai, Zechariah, Malachi). Although all the minor prophets are named, very little is known about most of them. Before the time of Christ these twelve books were joined together to make one scroll known collectively as "The Twelve." Their combined length (sixty-seven chapters) is about equal to that of Isaiah. <u>Author:</u> Zephaniah, the great, great grandson of King Hezekiah, and a prophet to the Southern Kingdom of Judah

Date Written: Between 640-609 BC, during the reign of King Josiah.

Theme of the Book: Future Global Judgment

Key Passage:

Zephaniah 1:14-18 The Day of the Lord is near

<u>Summary Statement:</u> The prophet Zephaniah cries out against the people of Judah to repent before they are punished like Israel was. The nation will undergo reform at the instruction of the righteous king Josiah, but it is a short-lived change and the people will quickly fall back into sin. Zephaniah warns that continued idolatry would lead to judgment by God, but insists that repentance is always an option (Zeph 2:3).



Author: Habakkuk, a prophet to the Southern Kingdom of Judah

Date Written: Habakkuk prophesied ~615-605 BC, before the fall of Judah.

Theme of the Book: Faith and Doubt in the Face of Judah's Exile

Outline of the Book:

I. Habakkuk's Perplexities (1-2)
II. Habakkuk's Prayer/Praise (3)

Key Passage:

Habakkuk 2:4 - "The righteous shall live by faith"

<u>Summary Statement:</u> Habakkuk is the record of the prophet's dialogue with God over His punishment of sin. At first, Habakkuk is shocked that God was not punishing Judah for their sin. God answers that He will judge them by means of the Chaldeans (Babylonians). Habakkuk is then confused on how God could use such an evil people to punish Judah. Ultimately, Habakkuk learns that God is sovereign over all things and can reward the righteous and punish the wicked in whatever way He sees fit. Habakkuk learns that God is worthy to be praised and trusted simply because He is God over all.

<u>Summary Statement:</u> The book of Haggai tells the story of the Jews recently returned to Jerusalem from captivity in Babylon. It records how they had grown complacent in the rebuilding of the temple and had instead pursued their own well-being. It describes how God sent His prophet Haggai to rebuke them and exhort them back to work. It explains how the people repented and returned to work and were blessed because of it. But ultimately, it tells how God is worthy. He is worthy to labor for and He is worthy to be worshiped. God deserved the maximum service and worship that the Jewish remnant could put forth, and He deserves it still today.

God's grace shines through, however, with multiple reminders that God will be a comforter and a protector to His people.

Key Passages:

<u>Summary Statement:</u> Malachi's word confronts a people skeptical of the promise and therefore indifferent in their commitment to live in the light of those promises and to worship and serve the Lord with all their hearts. The book may serve as a catechism for times of doubt and disappointment, when the professing people of God are tempted to break faith with their covenant God. The prophet's ministry is to light the lamp of faith in a disheartened people by reminding them of God's electing love (1:2) and to set forth the continuing obligations of the covenant to those who truly know God (3:16-18). – *The Reformation Study Bible, Ligonier, 2005*.
