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MAIN IDEA: The Beatitudes describe all true Christians, meaning *every* believer in Jesus Christ displays *all* the qualities (8) that Jesus states in the Sermon on the Mount (Matt. 5:3, 10). In Matthew 5:10–12, we consider several important insights into what it means as believers to be persecuted for our faith.
